

'Order, Border and Disorder in the Wider Europe'

29 June – 5 July 2014

The Warsaw Summer School takes as its overall focus the notion of the 'Wider Europe', a dynamic and evocative idea which expands the traditional study of Europe to include an ever growing part of the former Soviet Space. The themes 'order, border and disorder' will be mobilised to explore instances and patterns of cooperation, conflict and evolution in neighbourly relations, via an interdisciplinary curriculum, delivered by an international faculty.

Students will explore a wide range of political, economic, social, historical and security-related issues relating to domestic, regional and international developments in the area, as well as relations with the European Union and other actors, such as China and Turkey. The programme will enable students to engage with key questions to do with contemporary Russian foreign policy, the future of Ukraine, developments in Central Asia and the South Caucasus, the Eurasian Union, energy, borders and visa policies, amongst others. Instruction will be provided by leading academics and think-tankers from the Polish Institute of International Affairs (PISM), the Norwegian Institute of International Affairs (NUPI) and Collegium Civitas, as part of the Jean Monnet Chair.
