EntreComp framework (entrepreneurship competencies)



The EntreComp framework was constructed from results of a series of studies the Joint Research Centre for the European Commission. The framework is made up of three main areas: "ideas and opportunities", "resources" and "into action". Each of these is in turn made up by a number of competences that, together, are the building blocks of a sense of initiative and entrepreneurship as a competence.



Getting to rubrics: Innovation in social innovation education

VALUE Rubrics



The Association of American Colleges and Universities (AACU) has made available a range of model rubrics for various skills associated with modern liberal education. Included among the 16 rubrics are skills such as creativity, civic engagement, and integrative learning, all of which may be useful in the development of rubrics to assess social innovation in education.

Integrating social innovation in education**

Syllabus

The purpose of this course is to provide participants with a knowledge foundation for teaching and integrating social innovation as a subject and instructional strategy in higher education. It has initially been developed for instructors taking part in activities related to the Erasmus+ project, *Building Capacity for Social Innovation in Higher Education*, but is likely to be helpful for anyone interested in integrating social innovation in education.

This course is organised as a self-paced peer learning activity for groups of individuals who generally work together or for the same institution. Participants in the course are expected to be experienced educators who will openly share their own knowledge and experiences with other participants through critical discourse and collaborative projects. Participants in the course should work in teams and advance with them through the modules.

The course consists of three modules, each of which focuses on certain dimension of the overall course subject:

1. Module
 - a. Introduction to social innovation, key terms and scholarly discourse.
2. Module
 - a. Innovation and pedagogy
 - b. Teaching innovation/social innovation
 - c. Curriculum integration
3. Module
 - a. Learning beyond the classroom – community links
 - b. Assessing social innovation/social impact in learning

Each module consists of readings, collaborative projects and open discussions. Participants read readings individually, while collaborative projects are completed with assigned team members. Discussions are in open forums that involve all participants.



The expected learning outcomes of the course are:

- Participants are able to engage in meaningful discussion about social innovation:
 - Integrating key concepts:
 - Social innovation
 - Social need/demand/challenge
 - Social impact
- Participants are able to integrate social innovation in their teaching in ways that are meaningful and engaging for learners.
- Participants are able to relate taught subjects to communities' needs.
- Participants are able to evaluate the social impact embedded in their learners' output.

A more detailed list of learning activities that all participants are expected to engage in:

 - Using what has been learned
