'IMAGINING THE NEIGHBOURHOOD IN BETWEEN' RUSSIA, EUROPE, MEMORY AND SECURITY

19-23 September

Collegium Civitas, Palace of Culture, Warsaw

Overall Theme

The summer school is part of a Jean Monnet Network project 'NEMESIS', which is led by the Russian Southern Federal University with the involvement of the Universities Bremen, Amsterdam, Collegium Civitas in Warsaw and the University of Applied Sciences in Vienna. NEMESIS' agenda is concerned with issues to do with **security, memory and identity**, as well as the broader picture of evolving relations between Russia and Europe.

The main learning objectives of the Summer School are to get students acquainted with key issues to do with **developments in the Eastern neighbourhood, together with EU and Russian policies** towards the region and crucially, to be able to critically analyse them. Equally, the Summer School aims to furnish students with a strong understanding of concepts such as **identity, memory and security** and their implications for the study of Europe-Russia relations and the Eastern neighbourhood.

Optional Assessment

Teaching will be delivered by staff from NEMESIS partner institutions in the form of lectures, seminars and workshops. Active student participation is expected; students should do all reading before the start of the summer school and be prepared to do a short informal presentation on the final day. Students wishing to acquire 3 ECTS for the Summer School must complete a piece of written work in the form of an essay or policy style report of up to 4000 words.
